10 Quick Tips for Writing a Middle-Grade Novel

- Keep your content age-appropriate (your target audience is between 8 to 12 years old).
- Narrow in on whether you're writing for younger or older middle graders.
 There's a huge difference between what an 8-year-old knows and what a 12-year-old knows.
- 3. Choose a protagonist that your reader can relate to.
- 4. Spend time with tweens so that you understand their voice and the way that they think.
- 5. Keep your novel between 30,000 to 50,000 words.
- 6. Don't beat the reader over the head with a moral lesson at the end. Let them be smart enough to figure it out through your storytelling.
- 7. Make your protagonist either the same age or slightly older than the target reader.
- 8. Opt for shorter sentences and shorter chapters. Remember that your reader likely has a short attention span.
- Minimize adult interaction. The story should be completely focused on your tween protagonist.
- 10. Read as many middle-grade novels as you can to understand what readers may expect from your novel.
